
Believing in Achieving





Throughout this course at East End Literacy, I have achieved more than I ever expected. I met great people, it helped me find my way, and it made me believe in teachers again.




Believing in Achieving

I can see the school is helping me reaching my goals. Sooner or later, I believe I will be able to use my reading and writing for whatever I want.


Believing in Achieving

I gave them a call and started school there on Jan.20, 2003.

I was doing well, and learning about nouns, verbs, adverbs, and adjectives. But like grade school, I was not shown how to use what I was learning. I could read and write, but it never made any sense. One day the teacher asked me to write a paragraph about what I was going to do when I finished my upgrading.

I couldn't write the paragraph because I had no idea of how to put my thoughts into print. That's when I began to believe that my grade school teachers were right, and I was never going to achieve anything. I continued to go to school until one day I opened my apartment door, and I couldn't step outside the door.

I locked myself in my apartment for three months, and if I ventured out I was never alone. My doctor called it agoraphobia. He explained that I had it before, but we never noticed because I wasn't going out every day. But now I was hiding from the world, and watching it go by.

I stayed hidden until August 2003 when I received a phone call from East End Literacy. They asked me if I was still interested in attending class there. So once again I met with Brenda and this time there was room. I said yes, but I was still afraid of traveling from point A to point B. Brenda told me that there would be a spot for me, and all I had to do was show up.


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So on Tuesday September 16, 2003 I walked into class at East End Literacy for the first time, and I'm glad I did. Because if not for all the support and patience from the staff here, I would still be that scared, illiterate, hermit crab hiding in my shell.

When I started at East End Literacy, I couldn't even put two complete sentences together. Brenda taught me to focus on my abilities, and not my disabilities, to learn. Yes, I need to change words and numbers around to understand them, but I do understand. You see, now I know how I learn. I now believe that I can achieve what ever I set my mind to. And now I can write paragraphs, essays, and I have even written a couple of poems.

Now I do believe that I will achieve a higher education. Now I can answer that teacher's question. I want to work with children that learn the way I do. They need to know that they aren't alone. And they should be taught that whatever they believe in, they can achieve it, as long as they focus on their abilities and not their disabilities.

I never believed that I would achieve any of this when I started my learning adventure two years ago. But the best part of achieving is knowing that I did it, and I actually understand how I got here. By "here" I mean in the graduating class of 2004.



I would like to thank East End literacy for helping me to improve my reading and writing. I believe I will achieve my goal if I continue to do what I am doing now at East End Literacy.



I thank the Lord and the school for helping me to become a better reader and writer.





Hi, my name is Kathy. I come from a strong line of independent women. The people I am writing about have inspired me and given me the strength and will to be the person, mother and provider that I am today!



Work Woman Do Inside And Outside the Home

Today's women work in and outside the home. They excel in their workplace, like Clara Barton who established the American Red Cross and became its first president. Women are able to work outside the home and can have any career. Besides, at home, they are the backbone of the whole family.

Women manage everyday duties of the house. They do the cleaning, prepare the meals, and take care of the children and husband and do the grocery shopping. Women make sure the toilet, sink and bathtub are free from germs or bacteria. They make breakfast and tidy up the kitchen the living room; dining room and bedrooms are next. They shine all the glass, change the sheets on the beds, vacuum, sweep, mop and dust all the ornaments. They then get the children ready for school, but not before they had breakfast. While the husbands and children are away, they make their lunch, and after everyone comes home they prepare dinner.

Women are mostly the caregivers of the children, and it is one of the most difficult tasks. The tasks are usually different according to the children's ages. If the child is an infant or a baby, it is much more difficult because children at that age need a lot more attention. Moms are up all hours in the night for breast-feeding their babies. Their diapers have to be changed often. When they are that small, moms have to be extremely careful when they bath their babies. Moms must have time to play games with the baby such as peek-a-boo and help enhance their mind by sounding out words and talking to them very often.

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If the children are older, moms have to make sure they are up on time for school. They give them breakfast, prepare lunch for them to take to school, have them snacks when they return from school and have a hot/healthy dinner in the evening. Moms have to make sure they take a shower or bath, brush their teeth, say their prayers (if the parents are religious) at bedtime. Moms also help their children with their homework in math, English, science, etc. Finally moms are like psychologists to their children and husbands by helping them solve their problems.

Women are also there for their husbands to give them morale support, whether it is to listen to what problems they have at work, with their bosses or with co-workers. Finally women balance the checkbook by making sure there are sufficient funds to pay the mortgage or rent, and other bills and to use for the grocery, clothing, outing, and school activities, and the children. Generally that is the work women do inside the home.

In the past century, women were not allowed to work. But, during World War II, men had to go to war and there was desperate need of labor. So women enter the work force for a short period. But some influential women in history such as Belva Lockwood (the first woman to practice law before the u.s. supreme court), Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady-Stanton, fought courageously for the equality in education and work place, first time in history, for women. So women have been able to have a working career since then. They could become lawyers, doctors, office workers, managers, etc.

Women can be lawyers who help the innocent, prosecute the guilty, find evidence and establish their alibis. Women can be judges and have a final say if the person is guilty or innocent. Women can be doctors or nurses, healing those who are sick. They can operate, whether it is transplanting an organ or taking a bullet out of an innocent person. The school is the best, I must admit


I’ll be back. I will not quit.


Sally: Thank you for taking time out of your busy schedule to teach us those Christmas carols.

To Maria: It was nice to know you though you are so quiet.




